Stephen Quiller will be the IWS Workshop Instructor and WFWS-45 Juror for 2020. He will teach a 4-day Water-media Workshop May 6-9, 2020 at the Nazareth Center in Boise. Cost is \$500 and includes daily lunch.

Because we expect overly high demand for the Stephen Quiller workshop, we have decided to have an IWS members-only lottery drawing for the 24 seats. Why I paint abstracts

I am learning to break rules successfully

Forces me to think in deeper terms of the elements and principles of art

Brings a renewed excitement and passion to my work

Increase my visual experience, helps me interpret the world in new stories

Enables me to discover fresh ways to interpret my thoughts, my personal voice, and style

Pushes my limits, reminding me of the feeling of someone new to art

Challenges my sense of wonder and intrigue

Develops a new appreciation of what it takes to make good design

The experience I get when I play, experiment and expand my ideas; how can I use these methods, colors, textures, etc.....

For the joy of discovering & inspirational adventures

Increases my variety of media, tools and methods

Pushes new difficult colors, design and unusual compositions

Rearranges the elements and principles of art to bring a freshness to my work

Outcomes from working on abstract art

When I critique my students' artwork, my critique is rich and more diverse than before abstracts

It helps me develop my personal voice and help others discover theirs

Increases my student base and their horizons

Encourages the study of more kinds of art

Opens a new client base with increased sales

I take the viewer on an intentional journey through my artwork. My abstracts are purposeful using elements and principles of design arranged into new compositions and directions. My work has emotion and style woven into new forms that artists and clients can still recognize as a Linda Aman work of art.

I challenge you to explore new territory and thought processes in your current work. Take risk and know you are the only one who can produce the art you create. You are uniquely you. Enjoy the experience, go more for the education than the results and results will come.


About our instructor, Anne Merkley

"I have been a serious artist since the age of two, and while I earned a Masters in Fine Art degree from ISU, I consider myself to be mainly self-taught. Although I started painting with oils at eleven, I was afraid of watercolors, thinking I lacked the necessary discipline for using them. In 2006 I decided to give them a try, and have been juried into every IWS show I've entered since. I earned merit status with three awards in two years, which allowed me also to become a WFWS signature member.

"I have taught art in high school and college, and have been giving private lessons, classes, and workshops over a period of 50 years ... with the exception of long lapses for rearing my two children and working in the family business (the most recent being within the past seven years). I have entered and placed in dozens of competitions, from local shows to international, have sold or been commissioned to paint over a hundred pieces, and had numerous solo shows.

"I delight in the freedom of watercolor's fluidity, the beauty of its transparency, and the richness of its techniques. I love painting areas wet in wet and allowing colors to flow together, meanwhile bounding them with a hard edge. I appreciate not only the creative potential of this medium, but also the ease with which it can be used it to achieve the illusion of reality and yet remain abstract."

2020 IWS Spring Workshop

Anne Merkley, Presenter
March 12-13, 2020
Eagle United Methodist Church

A powerful composition is formed by the arrangement of negative and positive shapes in your painting. Much of this value contrast comes from patterns of light and shadow, without which there would be no form or color. Backlighting produces dramatic effects and allows utilizing the white of the paper, for which the medium of watercolor is famous.

We begin this workshop by learning how to choose the best idea from a number of your own photos to paint. The composition will be established first with a quick value study, followed by a carefully executed drawing on your watercolor paper. Next we will mask areas to be left unpainted or glazed later by other layers of color.

As the painting progresses, you will experience working in mid-tones while saving dark and light accents for last. We'll also practice using soft and hard edges to achieve the illusion of depth. The end of the second day will include a critique of paintings done in class.


