

Education VS Outcomes

If you want to improve your current painting skill, here are some suggestions to cultivate your paintings and how to reach farther.

Education - the act or process of imparting or acquiring knowledge or skills, as for a profession. An enlightened experience.

Outcomes - the final result of something, or the way things end up.

I strive to make the next fabulous, maybe even prizewinning, artwork. I plan and hope for the best outcome in each painting. Could I gain more if I consider the education and skill factors in my plans before the painting? What can I learn vs produce in this current painting to take me to the next level in my work? In many of my paintings I play it safe, but there are more and more times when I am taking risks, sometimes small, sometimes larger.

Excuses to just play it safe: (you probably have your own lists)

- I want all my paintings to be successful.
- I only have so much of my time to paint.
- I don't like mistakes and don't want to mess up my painting or do it again.

If my purpose of painting is education, then I can take my art into a new learning experience, method or thought process. Then I may need to have a different mindset on a painting at least some of the time. What can I learn, risk, explore? What new discoveries await me that I can transfer to future paintings? What I learn may not work in this painting, but it may work in the future.

I can learn what to do and what not to do. These are equally important. If the saying "we learn from our mistakes" is true, then I should be very talented by now!

If I really mess up a painting with the mindset of education, I switch gears and make it into another discovery. Many times, these have ended up being artwork I have sold or won awards. Consider starting with small risks.

In my painting above, "Terraced Hot Springs", I tried new ways of using masking fluid, to make the textures of the hot springs in Yellowstone. After months of tiny details, painting, shadowing, and softening most of the textures for the details I took a calculated risk in my next steps. Towards the end of the painting I added large glazed areas of altering colors over major areas knowing I could "ruin" my outcome. The risks paid off; this painting got into the national show in Idaho Falls this year. I remember very well thinking I could "ruin this painting". The juror stated he could "feel the bubbling heat and texture", reasons he chose it for the show! He was surprised it was all watercolor!

I keep exploring new directions in my work that are exciting! In addition to enhancing my skills, I may also have a wonderful painting.

If it has been a struggle to keep motivated, I am encouraging you to keep up your artistic endeavors. You can create and play in new ways that will open expression in your own unique voice. You are the only one in the world who can paint and create just like you.

I'll keep this simple. It's my thinking when I'm planning a painting. The planning may be several days (or even more) or the few minutes before things begin to move.

Composition is *always* first...begin every painting as an abstract design even in detailed realistic work to come.

Contrast is *always* second and part of composition...keep it simple...three value thinking as usually enough.

Experiment with color...even "crazy" ones...mix them...sometimes try some new colors.

Become your own best critic...don't be too easily satisfied...having a new thought? Try it!


Be impulsive and audacious...see what you can get away with...take risks...make mistakes.

Never stop thinking, drawing, painting.

Photo from Exhibit: Here is a picture of *Mum*, one of the pieces currently in my Thesis Exhibition, "The Seeds of Morrow." I use diluted glaze washes, along with oxides, and mason stains in my sculptural ceramics, which is highly in fluenced by my work in watercolors. *(Essentially, it is a*) watermedia, which is then baked.) One of the reasons I tend to enjoy ceramics as much as I do is that it combines my many experiences in diverse media. In parallel with working in watercolor, the process makes me strategize while leaving room for the unknown. I am always surprised by the outcome. It helps me embrace the beauty in what it became, rather than what I hoped it would become.
