Are You Losing an Edge?

Are you losing an edge in your watercolors? If not, you may be missing an opportunity to make your paintings more interesting.

Many leading art instructors believe that some combination of "lost and found" edges in paintings is something we should strive for. As you know, a lost edge is one that seems to disappear, while a hard edge creates a sharp contrast. In watercolor most lost edges are created on a wet or damp surface or by a lifting process using a sponge or damp tissue. A "found" or hard edge is usually done on dry paper with a contrast in value or color.

The appeal of a lost edge is to add conflict or contrast to your hard edges thereby creating interest. If all edges are the same your painting may be harmonious, but too monotonous. I think some mix or balance with edges is preferable.

We all sometimes fall victim to the practice of trying to achieve reality by including every detail of our subject. Leaving out a few edges is an excellent way to avoid this trap. Leaving something to the imagination of your viewer is more intriguing, and sometimes adds to the reality of the viewer by allowing them to complete the story you are creating. Watercolor is a medium that lends itself to soft transitions where shapes seem to melt into each other and we should take advantage of that.

To demonstrate, I experimented with two paintings of the same subject.

One has predominantly hard edges and the other mostly lost edges. While some may prefer the hard edge version, I hope you can see the benefit of trying to add lost edges to your watercolors.


Regional News - Fall 2023

- Sponsor's Choice Award went to Gloria Miller Allen for "JEB and the Pioneer"


We still have a People's Choice Award which will be announced on December 12th, so be sure to stop by the Willard Art Center and vote for your favorite.
