"Creating New Inspiration for 2024" - Linda Aman-Aman Arts

As an artist, the completion of one painting begins the quest for "What do I paint next"? When

pondering the next piece, I explore various methods to ignite fresh creativity. While my daily routine involves more than just painting – encompassing teaching, research, speaking engagements and planning - each contributes to my artistic journey.

Over the years of practice, I've discovered 10 key insights that have not only enriched my own

artistic process but also benefited the artists I mentor and collaborate with. In this list, I provide a glimpse into these transformative points of decision-making. Using this method keeps me on track and maintain ideas for a series or the next set of paintings I will create. While each of these points could be a full article, I am only touching on a few items to ponder.

- 8. Use quality art supplies.
- 9. New compositions, styles, directions.
- 10. Celebrate with Gratitude and Thankfulness



THE LOADED BRUSH

I think most artists have a comfort zone, a style or subject matter that they like and return to frequently. We can settle into a pattern of painting the same or similar subject, or applying the same or similar elements of design. There is really nothing wrong with this. After all, most of our best work is because we are inspired by something we like and want to share on paper. Why change course when you are finally happy in your own comfort zone?

For some of us, the answer may be don't change, and that could be the right choice. For me, however, I think some departure from my comfort zone can be a positive learning opportunity. For many years I have been primarily a landscape painter. After living in the midwest, I found Idaho's mountains, canyons and rivers offered all the inspiration I needed. In

2007 I had the opportunity to travel to San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, a place loaded with Spanish colonial architecture and lively street scenes. These were subjects clearly out of my comfort zone, but begging to be painted in plein air which was also challenging for me. The results were predictable, my nice paper rendered less valuable after each painting. I have been able to return to San Miguel many times, still trying to capture the magic of this place in watercolor. There has been some improvement, but my closet is full of San Miguel watercolors that have only one good side, the one I didn't paint on. Of course, any painting can be a learning experience, but for me, trying to paint unfamiliar subjects on location taught me more. I had to focus more on shape, light, values and less on detail, while paying attention to what worked and what did not. It was similar to art workshops I have attended, which open the door to a style or technique I haven't tried.

I will always still enjoy painting landscapes which, over time, show the influence of my time painting south of the border, hopefully in a positive way. Watercolor is a difficult medium and wanting to stay in your comfort zone is understandable. I think you will find, however, that exploring a fresh subject or style will be worthwhile and rewarding in your artistic journey.

-Last year I applied to an art call from the World Congress of Fisheries. Since I no longer have the original painting, I applied for the digital portion of the call. My painting, Abstract Fish, was accepted and will be shown digitally on a large screen. The World Congress meets at the Hyatt Regency in Seattle the first week of March and is attended by scientists from around the world.

--I am having a show with another artist (Ryan Law) at the Moscow Food Co-op that hangs through February. We are donating 100% of proceeds from the sales to the Humane Society of the Palouse. 29 paintings are hanging.

Many of our IWS Southwest regional members started the year off with a bang participating in the Eagle Extreme Plein Air event where they faced the challenges of cold weather painting. Others kept their brushes wet with daily painting challenges through the month of January, such as the Strada Easel challenge.

Dual members continue to paint weekly at Edwards Greenhouse, Warehouse Food Hall in Boise, various parks, and the nature center. These meetups not only provide inspiration and change of scenery for artists, but develop friendships and camaraderie as well.

Our own Karen Hickman taught a wonderful workshop on portrait painting on February 23 for the Nampa Art Guild, and Beth Trott has an exhibit available to view at the Northwest Lineman College.

The whole region is buzzing in preparation for the IWS Rotunda Show, and some members have also submitted entries for a local "Leap Into Art" show, and the local Vinearts Spring Show "Seasons".

The Southwest art scene is thriving and you can find IWS well represented with members showcasing the beauty and versatility of watercolor.

South Central Region News Connie Pepper

Our South Central group is small but active! Our local members are working hard to encourage watercolor painting as well as membership in IWS. We have a partner in Magic Valley Arts Council (MVAC) and their mission to provide art learning lessons. We appreciate their promotion of classes and use of their facilities to teach painters about watercolor. The first class offered in watercolor was a session called "Gobs and Blobs" taught by Connie Pepper. This abstract experimentation class was based on the current MVAC show hanging in the Full Moon Gallery. The two-hour session was designed for any level of watercolor experience. It was fun and well attended by budding artists from the area.

In addition to the abstract class, Leslie Lambert is teaching beginning classes in watercolor at MVAC. Leslie's classes include a four Thursdays class called "Create Your Own Reference Book". Painters will work each week on basic watercolor skills and will create their own reference book. (See pictures) The painters will learn to tear paper, paint a graded wash, mix colors, etc. Leslie is also providing a class in watercolor landscapes and reflections class in March called "Thaw: The Art of Reflections and Renewal". ("Thaw" is also a featured theme in the Full Moon Gallery). We are lucky to have Leslie teaching in our area. Upcoming learning opportunities at MVAC include a watercolor class we are working on with Hugh Mossman in May. We are having a lot of fun and learning a lot!! Thanks to MVAC for working with us to increase watercolor awareness and provide classes in the area!







IWS East Region News Les Scott

Our most recent regional show was in the administration building at the College of Eastern Idaho and ran the month of February. We had 24 paintings in the show and the response from staff and students while we were hanging the show was great. This show definitely falls in line with our mission to "educate the public as to the significance of watercolor painting". It was also awesome to see some advertising and our paintings displayed on CEI's digital sign out front.



Our next regional show will be held at The Art Museum of Eastern Idaho (TAM) beginning May 2 nd and ending on June 15 th .

In January we held a paint out at the Museum of Idaho (MOI). This was a great opportunity for us to paint and sketch living rainforest animals in the current MOI exhibit "Under the Canopy" which contains a variety of living specimens such as a sloth, lizards, turtles, and snakes. I hope to continue this event with future exhibits at MOI and have the full support of the MOI staff to make this happen.







I also now have our contract in place for our Fall exhibition with the Idaho Falls Arts Council and have submitted our application to The Art Museum of Eastern Idaho (TAM) for the Spring of 2025.
