As with the growth of any organization, we are at a point where desperately we need help in a few important areas. The following functions will soon lack leaders.

## **Inspiration on Vacation-Linda Aman**

We are on vacation in Hawaii, staying in a home we rented from a friend, which allows us to enjoy a couple of weeks here. I brought along art materials to paint and experiment with these beautiful new surroundings. My supplies include watercolors and other media for creating *en plein air* paintings and mixed media works.

At first, it took me some time to get into the flow of trying something new and allowing myself to play freely. But now, I feel a greater sense of freedom to explore and see what happens.

The surrounding leaves where we are staying have inspired my work. I love opposites and enjoy combining contrasting elements in my paintings. I experimented by painting around actual leaves placed on the paper, then cutting stencils of the same shapes to paint watercolor through. Playing with this process, I added vibrant, bold colors inspired by Hawaii. The ovals in my painting came from shadows cast onto the canvas by the trees. What started as abstract blobs unexpectedly turned into native fish! At one point, a gecko even ran across my canvas, reminding me I wasn't the only one playing.

The result is a whimsical Hawaii-inspired composition created with watercolor, acrylic, and pen, blending the balance of opposites—shadows and color, nature and abstraction.

Travel has sparked fresh inspiration and led me to discover a new painting style—something I may not have explored at home. Below are a few of the outcomes we can get from painting in a new environment.

- New Inspiration: Fresh scenery, colors, cultural influences spark creativity
- Different Light and Atmosphere: Can influence mood and the values of colors
- Personal Growth: Stepping outside your comfort zone on vacation encourages experimentation and growth.
- Cultural Context: A new culture can shift your perspective and add distinct elements to your art, such as motifs or techniques.
- New Color Palettes: The colors of your surroundings, such as tropical hues or earthy tones, can inspire palettes you might not use at home
- Emotional Connection: The art created on vacation often holds sentimental value, as it captures your personal experience of a particular place and time.
- **Unconventional Subjects:** Settings introduce subjects like exotic flora, fauna or architecture that broadens your repertoire.
- **Heightened Emotional State:** Vacations often evoke excitement, relaxation, or awe, which can infuse your art with more dynamic energy or a sense of calm.
- Opportunity to Disconnect: A break in your regular routine can help you with focus.

## **NEED HELP?**

We all need help from time to time. For some time, I have been leaning too hard on dark values which, while important, can lead to overworked watercolors that lack transparency. I needed some help.

While looking at an old art publication, I came across a painting by Rex Brandt, a California artist who I had long admired (see photo at right).




It caught my attention because it was light, fresh and was depicting a scene in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, a place where I have traveled and painted. It had a fresh feel opposite of some of my work.

Believe it or not, golf can be like watercolor- both are difficult and can be frustrating. When I was struggling with a hook, a golf pro told me to try to hit a slice, which curves the opposite way. It should follow then, if I am painting too dark, try painting too light, kind of like Brandt's painting.

I pulled a painting of mine out of an enormous pile of San Miguel paintings too good to throw away but too bad to show (see photo at right).



I have found over the years that these paintings do not usually get better by themselves, so I decided to do the same scene, but with a Brandt light touch. I used a minimum of



brush strokes and left most of the painting white or very light (see photo left).

While the result will never be compared to Brandt in a favorable way, it is a start. In golf parlay, it may not be right down the middle, but I am not hooking it. The message here is if you are not happy with your paintings and need help, try to identify your problem

and over-correct, perhaps inspired by an artist you admire. I think your *artist "handicap"* will improve.

The schedule for our South Central group's monthly 2nd Tuesday sessions is coming together nicely!

In December we will have a "Holiday Painting Party" with the opportunity to paint, exchange paintings, and enjoy a potluck meal. The paintings exchanged are another way to celebrate our art journeys, and to give something of ourselves.

In January, we are fortunate to learn with Michelle George. Michelle is a SC member who has been attending calligraphy classes at CSI. She will share some of what she has learned in a demo. Her plan is to show us how to do a "Versal" letter using ink and watercolor. A versal is a large decorative letter used to mark the opening of a line, paragraph or verse in a manuscript. Versals are present in many ancient manuscripts as well as in many books published today. We will draw and paint versals on small Zentangle tiles to practice this ancient art. We look forward to this great option for thinking differently about how to use watercolor, using an old technique in new watercolor artwork!



On to February. We will be painting rocks. A friend of our IWS painters, Kym Syth, will bring along all that is needed to paint decorative rocks. This is an activity that will take us out of our comfort zone of painting with watercolor and on paper. We will leap into the world of using rocks as a substrate and acrylic paint as our medium. It is a fun activity and painters will be asked place one of their imaginative rocks



along the canyon trail. Currently, there is a long line of painted rocks placed along the trail near the Twin Falls Center for the Arts. These rocks have been painted by community members, young and old. It is a new tradition, and will be fun to join in by adding to the collection.



# Call for 2025 Artist Wild Blues Artist-in-Residence Program

### Open until January 15, 2025

Greater Hells Canyon Council (GHCC) is thrilled to announce our first open call to artists for the 2025 Wild Blues Artist-in-Residence Program. We encourage all artists with a connection to the Blue Mountains Region to apply.

This program is dedicated to exploring the theme "Refugia of the Blue Mountains." Refugia are wildlands, wild rivers, and wild pockets offering safe havens for native plants and wildlife to survive rapid climate change. Refugia are often places of rich beauty and healthy resilience with an unsurpassed capacity to preserve biodiversity, sequester carbon, and enrich the lives of humans. They safeguard the future of all life on earth. They are here in the Blue Mountains of NE Oregon.

Please join us for a year of exploring the intersections between creative thought and environmental conservation. Help us foster wider public awareness of your work as an artist and our work of protecting the wildlife and landscapes of the Blue Mountains. During the residency year the artist will produce work(s) around the theme of "Refugia of the Blue Mountains". We invite individuals from diverse backgrounds and disciplines to explore the multifaceted dimensions of "Refugia" in our beloved NE Oregon.

The selected artist is expected to complete a body of work to be exhibited at a suitable, agreed upon, event promoted by the artist and GHCC, during the residency year. The event format will vary depending upon the nature of the art and preferences of the artist. Artist and/or artwork will be displayed at a fall GHCC event in La Grande, OR in early October.

The artist will benefit from GHCC's promotion of their work through print, web, social media, and other means. They will receive \$2,000 for the residency year to contribute towards supplies and travel expenses. They will also be offered a 10 day residency at <u>Good Bear Ranch Mountain</u> Retreat in Baker City, OR to support their creative process.

We wish to embrace an expansive perspective of environmental conservation that recognizes the power of diverse ways of knowing and being. Collaborating with art and artists of all kinds is one important way of doing this.

### To Apply:

Applying artists should send examples of past work that best demonstrates an expression of our "Refugia" theme. Please see our website <a href="https://www.hellscanyon.org/wild-blues-artist-in-residence">www.hellscanyon.org/wild-blues-artist-in-residence</a> for submission form and instructions.

### Applications are due by January 15, 2025.

A selection committee will review the applications and choose an artist with whom we will work. Selection will be based on the artists' work quality, artistic relevance to GHCC's mission, and availability for engagement during the calendar year. Artists will be notified of acceptance, or otherwise by February 1, 2025.
